CHRISTMAS 2006

There's a fairy-tale – almost soap-opera side to the Christmas story. All the necessary ingredients are there: the romance of an unmarried mum and her loyal consort; the intrigue of Herod, clearly up to no good; and lashings of royalty – Herod himself and those kings from lands afar and, above all, the new-born king himself. Many people like it exactly that way – set in a safe framework of candles and carols.

But there is another side to Christmas. Last year I was sent a card with these words by Howard Thurnam:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks – then the work of Christmas begins: To find the lost, to heal the broken, To feed the hungry, to release the prisoner. To rebuild the nations, to bring peace among people. To make music in the heart.

And it's true that when we think of Christmas we often get stuck in the nostalgic or the romantic and people who like the fairy-tale side get cross when others inject a sense of realism. On the other hand people who regularly face the plight of the homeless and hungry get cross when Christmas is trivialised into romantic escapism. So we often end up with the worst of both worlds; a vaguely religious glow that lasts for a few hours, and a political conscience that hurts.

Christmas actually announces that God wants the best of both worlds. The romantic approach, at its best, is a way of saying that there's more to reality than meets the eye. The political approach is a way of saying that religion isn't much use if it doesn't work down at street level. And, of course, they are both true. But perhaps the wider and better way is to see the God of Christmas who loved, and loves, and goes on loving is not an escapist God who merely produces the occasional rosy glow – nor does he want his people to be escapist either.

To illustrate the first part – about God loving us – consider the flowery language of the season. How often do any of us say that we 'adore' somebody or something and really mean it? Yet we've already invited each other to come and 'adore him' quite a few times. The danger is that we think this language is cosy and romantic – in reality it's the language of passion. Christmas invites us to be passionate about God because Christmas tells us that God is passionate about us. And if that sounds over-the-top, then we need to let God break through to the real people that we are, not the screens put up to protect us against the various



slings and arrows we encounter in life, but the real us. That's what God loves, the real us – everything that we have and are – not just the sanitised veneer we put on for others – but us – warts and all ! Christmas invites us to love him in return and the reality of that is the deepest and richest reality there is.

Once we are honest, and truly in touch with that reality, then we are free to serve him by giving that same love to other people who, like Jesus himself, on that day he was born, was helpless and totally dependent on other people and God. God's Christmas love reaches out to all through those who adore the Child of Bethlehem. That's not politics – it's love. It is reality – the Word made Flesh and dwelling among us.

The Priory Church was a very special place in Alf's long life of dedication, service and faith. He joined the electoral roll in 1929, and was married at the Priory in 1938. He served the church as a sidesman, Superintendent of the Sunday School, PCC member and Churchwarden. He had a great passion for the wider work of the Church in India, Pakistan and South Africa. This was greatly influenced by his experience of these countries in WWII. In his later years due to a significant loss of hearing his often late and loud 'Amen' became a part of the Parish Eucharist.

### 'O COME, O COME .....'

Our new organ scholar David Stokes introduces himself I was born in Liverpool in 1985 and grew up in West Derby Village.

I have been involved in church music from the age of 13 by singing in the choir and playing the organ at St. James West Derby. I started to learn the

organ at <u>Liverpool Cathedral</u>'s annual organ course with Ian Wells, and then I started to have private lessons with Colin Porter at Mossley Hill Parish Church. I became organ scholar at Mossley Hill and helped out by playing the organ and singing Tenor and Bass in the choir.

I attended St. Margaret's C of E High School in Aigburth where I got my GCSE's, and then went into full time employment as an organ builder for the firm of Henry Willis & Sons Ltd. I worked for Willis's for a year visiting different churches around the country and maintaining and looking after their organs.

I then left and did my A-levels at Liverpool Community College, I passed them and then went on to do a Higher National Diploma in Music Performance. I graduated this year (2006) which has led me on to study here at Lancaster University.


My last organist's post was at <u>St. Paul's Stoneycroft</u>, which was designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott.

As well as being the organist at St. Paul's I was also a member of the choir at the parish church of <u>St. Anne Stanley</u>. (Your very own Father Peter was curate at St. Anne's from 1976-1979.) I helped out by singing bass and doing most of the organ accompaniment for the choir there. The choir is 35 strong, with a big repertoire! They have done a tour at the Czech Republic in 2004, and have sung both morning and evening services at Liverpool Cathedral this year and last during the summer. I have also given a half hour organ recital at Liverpool Cathedral this year during

he summer in which Ian Wells (Assistant organist of the Cathedral) was giving me his expert tuition and advice and prepared me for the recital.

I am currently in my 1<sup>st</sup> year of a music degree at Lancaster University and I am hoping to work in education afterwards.

I am already enjoying my scholarship at Lancaster priory, and I hope I can gain lots of professional experience in the field of church music from Jeremy Truslove & Ian Pattinson. #### PCC DIGEST

#### Meeting held on Monday 23rd October 2006

#### "Chairman's Items"

• In the absence of a Head Verger, and until further notice, on Sundays the Priory will be open from 7.00am to 1.00pm, closed until 5.00pm, then open until after evensong. Thanks were expressed to the Assistant Vergers for the extra duties undertaken by them.

• Dr Jo Drew is to be included in those able to administer communion at the Priory, and Ms Marjorie Greenwood and Mrs Kath Ralph at St George's.

#### "Safe from Harm" Matters.

• Eleven people have submitted themselves for CRB clearance.

• Risk assessments, particularly involving the Priory Hall kitchen and storage areas, were discussed.

#### Financial Matters.

• Income from church collecting boxes is well down compared to 2005. Security of these boxes, and other monetary safekeeping in the Priory was discussed.

• 2007 budget will be presented at the November meeting. It is anticipated there will be a shortfall of income compared to expenditure. There will be increases in the cost of heating, lighting and water, the Parish Share and salaries.

#### **WORKING GROUPS**

#### St George's:

• Rev Paul Payton commenced his duties on 8<sup>th</sup> October 2006. Services and administration are to brought more into line with those at the Priory. Mr John Manderson is stepping down from his duties at St George's, but will continue covering financial matters until the next AGM. Money in St George's bank account will remain for the use of St George's. Mr Manderson was thanked for his hard work and time given to St George's.

• Church contacts with Willow Lane Primary School and the Apple Tree Nursery are being fostered, particularly involving children, young people and parents.

#### Property :

• The centre gate pillar at the entrance to the main drive will not be re-installed as fire tenders cannot enter the driveway with the pillar in position. A removable steel post will be installed in its place to restrict entry to the drive, if required.

• Memorial Garden – a third tablet will be added to the two vertical "In Memoriam" tablets installed at the northern side of the garden, on the refectory side of the inscribed tablet.

• The stone pillar from the entrance to the drive is to be relocated to the Memorial garden boundary to form a corner return to the Priory tower.

As from 23<sup>rd</sup> October, interment of ashes in the Memorial garden will be on the following basis :

□ Ashes only, without any urn or box, will be interred.

Marking of new interments with a small memorial tablet will cease.

□ The name of the person, and relevant dates, whose ashes are interred will be inscribed on the 'In Memoriam' tablets at the north wall.

□ Existing small tablets marking interments can have a full name and dates inscribed, if required.

□ Plots which have already been reserved and paid for can be marked with a small tablet as previously arranged.


