# The Other Within: Thinking about the Japanese Case With Special Attention to Koreans in Japan

This is the first part of a two part writing seminar. In this post-binary age it may sound passe to talk about an "other" but this is the terminology in which much discourse has been couched. We will analyze this approach. During the first quarter we will read widely in the literature on race and ethnicity in order to seek an historicized language for thinking about the Japanese case. Each student will formulate a writing project by the end of the quarter, that meets individual needs depending on the stage of the student's work. During the Autumn quarter of 2001, the class will meet periodically to exchange criticisms of the writing project. The written work will be due at the end of that quarter, in 285b. Students wishing to take this as a one-quarter course must confer with the professor.

The goals of this course are thus four-fold:

- 1) discussion of race vs. ethnicity as categories
- 2) careful reading of texts (leading to writing of one's own piece)
- an introduction to historiographical issues surrounding the issue of "others" in Japan, taking into account how the positioning of Koreans (do we want to say "Resident Koreans"?) is analogous to the positioning of other outsiders in Japan including women who are both within and outside, and thus taking into considerations multiple intersections also.
- 4) A project proposal of approximately ten pages with select bibliography to be developed into a 30-45 page paper during 285b.

### A note on language

Students are encouraged to read Japanese language sources for the course. Those who can read Korean only will report on relevant materials. There will be alternative readings in English on all topics. Graduate student writing projects will use primary documents in Japanese, Korean, or other languages.
