The Sculpture Garden is always open. Students are asked not to touch the sculptures but they are very welcome to enjoy the gardens. Students and their teachers may also wish to visit the Fiona Hall <i>Fern garden</i> . The NGA Café is available for light refreshments and the Gallery Shop stocks catalogues, postcards, posters, books and gifts.
Study days	Study days conducted by Gallery educators link the Gallery visit to classroom studies and curricula across all key learning areas. Study days can last up to half a day and may include tours, workshops, slide talks and films.

Professional development for teachers	Professional development sessions for groups of teachers are organised on request all year. Please contact us to discuss your needs. Teachers' breakfasts during major exhibitions bring teachers together and provide an opportunity to view exhibitions, preview resources and services and discuss strategies.
The collection study room	The collection study room allows small groups of researchers and students to view works of art not on display in the galleries. Admission is by appointment three weeks in advance to allow the works to be transferred from storage and prepared for viewing.
Summer Art Scholarship	National Gallery of Australia and Sony Foundation Australia Summer Art Scholarship Each year in January the Gallery brings selected Year 11 visual arts students from around Australia to Canberra for an intensive week of study. 
