Since it was initiated in 2003, the Masterpieces for the Nation Fund has assisted the Gallery to acquire five significant works of art for the national collection: William Robinson's Creation landscape – fountains of the earth 2002, WC Piguenit's Near Liverpool, New South Wales c. 1908, Sydney Long's Flamingoes c. 1905–06, Jeffrey Smart's Lovers by house 1956 and Festival of the cattle [Gopashtami], a nineteenth-century Indian pichhavai.

This year we are again offering donors the choice of two works: Indigenous Australian artist Doreen Reid Nakamarra's Untitled 2007 and Autumn moon festival [Sharad Purnima], a eighteenth-century Indian pichhavai.





Doreen Reid Nakamarra Untitled

Doreen Reid Nakamarra is a young Pintupi/Ngaatjatjarra artist with an extraordinary vision of her country. Her use of contrasting colour, tone and line take you on a virtual journey across her traditional country. Her expert use of zigzags of varying lengths give the sense of movement and show the tali (sand hills) around Marrapinti, a significant rock hole site to Nakamarra.

Nakamarra was one of thirty Indigenous artists whose work was featured in Culture Warriors: National Indigenous Art Triennial. This work was a particular highlight for many visitors to the exhibition. It was displayed on a plinth on the ground and gave a true sense of the shifting nature of Nakamarra's land. Untitled will be a valuable and significant addition to the Gallery's collection of Ngaatjatjarra and Pintupi artists works.

Autumn moon festival [Sharad Purnima]

Finely painted Indian *pichhavai* (shrine hangings), particularly those depicting Krishna, have become a focus of the Gallery's Asian art collection.

This large *pichhavai* was a backdrop for a sumptuous Sharad Purnima (autumn moon festival) shrine. Celebrating Krishna's legendary dance with the gopis (milkmaids), the festival is an important ceremony for the Vallabha Hindu sect. An avatar of Vishnu, Krishna grew up in a village in India and was adored for his mischievous personality and miraculous deeds.

Flamboyantly costumed Krishna appears here with arm raised, flanked by adoring *gopis*. The imagery refers to the lifting of Mount Govardhana and the dance of love. The child Krishna tricked the rain god Indra, who retaliated with a great storm. Krishna then lifted the mountain to shelter his cows and herders. In another legend, Krishna enticed the *gopis* to dance during the autumn full moon and magically multiplied himself to dance simultaneously with each enthralled woman. An insight into Vallabha ritual, the border comprises scenes of seasonal Krishna festivals.
