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Laborers For Christ is a ministry of the Lutheran Church Extension Fund that helps congregations undertake construction projects and build within their budgets.

Kingsland, Ga., fellowship hall brings Laborer full circle

eventeen years after taking part in his first construction project working for Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Laborers For Christ's Bob McCoy is right back where he started: at the Kingsland, Ga., church.

The first time,
McCoy was working
in construction at
the nearby Kings Bay
Naval Submarine Base
and decided to help
Laborers who were
erecting Holy Trinity's
original church building.
Today, he is the project
manager, working for
the congregation, on a

6,290-square-foot addition, which includes a fellowship hall, six Sunday school classrooms, a kitchen, two bathrooms, and a 35-foot breezeway that joins the new facility to the church.

Serving as a Laborer, McCoy says, is like serving God. "When I get up in the morning, I say, 'Lord, what can I do for You today?'" McCoy, 75, added he plans to continue as a Laborer "until the Lord wants me," mostly because he gets to meet a lot of people and has fun.

This "second time around" at Holy Trinity went so smoothly, McCoy says, that Laborers finished their work for the congregation two months early. The new addition was dedicated March 30.

Holy Trinity's Rev. Paul Koch says he and the 150-member congregation are excited about getting more ministry space. "Our building is used almost every day and night of the week, from Scouts to (Navy) wives groups—not to mention Bible studies and confirmation (classes)—and this will certainly enable us to do much more," he said. With the extra classrooms, the congre-

gation also plans to start a preschool in the not-too-distant future.

Laborers have been a special blessing, according to the pastor, for their "excellent" craftsmanship and "their addition to our worship and study of God's Word."

"It has been a pleasure to get to know these fine men and women, and it has been a positive experience for our whole congregation," Koch said of the Laborers. "Seeing everyone out on a Saturday, swinging hammers and lending a hand, builds a wonderful sense of community that can get so lost these days. The Laborers became a catalyst to help us build together, just as we also worship and learn together."

Koch said the addition was affordable, thanks both to the congregation's ability to employ Laborers—who are experts at "saving a buck without scrimping on quality"—and a Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) loan.

"One of the great things about the Laborers is that this is what they do—they know what churches need and what they don't," the pastor said. "When I tell my brothers in the ministry

A Rendezvous at the Synod's origins

espite a very cool spring, Missouri warmed with friendship and fellowship as active and retired Laborers came together for the biennial LFC Rendezvous. Hosts Denny and Flo Tellinghuisen, Barb Gahring, and Dawn Baker worked to bring Laborers together for faith, fellowship, and some Synod history.

The Rendezvous is open to all active, inactive, widows and widowers, and retired Laborers and their spouses. The main objective of the Rendezvous is fellowship and reunion of friendships. This year's event was held April 3-5 in Perryville, Mo., with the event theme "Come Back to Your LCMS Roots."

By attending events like the Rendezvous and the regional Getaway events—which are held where many of the Laborers spend the winter (see sidebar at right)—participants "keep the connection," said Dan Baker, LFC Director. "Laborers are an extremely dedicated group of people. I draw strength from their dedication to the ministry," he said, adding that each event reinforces the enthusiasm and powerful fellowship they all share.

This year's Rendezvous kicked off with a dinner served by members of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Perryville, and hosted by LCEF. Under bright blue skies Saturday, tours included the Saxon Memorial and the Lutheran Heritage Center and Museum

in Altenburg, Mo. The museum's extensive collection includes artifacts such as tools used by the Saxon Lutherans who settled this area in 1839; a gorgeous hand-carved organ; clothing and uniforms from various eras; and furniture used in the Log Cabin Concordia Seminary, the first LCMS school of ministry.

A tour of the Concordia Lutheran Church in Frohna, Mo., led then to a chicken dinner held at Concordia School. Entertainment was provided by the Saxon Hills Band.

The next Rendezvous will be April 9-10, 2010, in Lodi, Calif.

Longtime dream of church expansion comes true

ince their restrooms were demolished as part of a 1,139-square-foot expansion, members of Holy Cross Lutheran Church have experienced some "discomfort and disruption" in Atwater, Calif.

But no one has uttered a complaint. "We have waited such a long time, and everyone is thrilled to see that it (the expansion) is actually happening," said Scott Belyea, the church's building committee chairman. "They know how important this is to our church."

Laborers For Christ working for Holy Cross are helping build a "more welcoming" entryway, a deluxe kitchen, and more accessible restrooms.

Along with the expansion, Laborers have helped "revitalize" the congregation, Belyea said. They coordinate congregation workdays and participate in Bible studies. Laborer Frank McKinley sings with the church choir.

"They have brought a united feeling to the congregation and given us something to rally around in the way of the new building," Belyea said. Plans are for a July "grand opening." Members are eager to introduce their community to a facility they hope will help draw more people to church.

"Within the last month, we've already

LFC thanks Bill Bruncke, database support

ittle did Bill Bruncke know that serving the church meant he would be using the same skills he used while employed by Texas Instruments.

Bruncke retired from Texas Instruments in the mid-1990s, and joined his wife Dolores serving the Church. Dolores was a commercial editor, and published Plumb Line, the newsletter dedicated to the Laborers For Christ (LFC) organization. Through this association, Bruncke learned LFC was developing a computer database with which to manage project and member information.

LFC had been using a database pro-

gram that was not quite meeting its needs. As the staff tried other database programs, nothing seemed to fit. Bruncke had the professional background and skills to take on the task of finding the right system. He was thorough in his approach and knew the right questions to ask.


To gain a better understanding of LFC, Bruncke and Dolores traveled across the country visiting construction sites, meeting members of Laborers, even taking photos of people and projects. He attended committee meetings in St. Louis, conferences and special sessions in an effort to learn how to make the database best serve the organization. He suggested a Micro-

Arkansas congregation gets new family life center—and more

elping build a family life center where youngsters will play basketball, stage plays, and enjoy recess on rainy days proved especially meaningful for LFC members working for Salem Lutheran Church and School.

That's because Laborers "really got to know many of the kids," said Norm Hoppmann, project manager for the Springdale, Ark., congregation. "We would walk down the hallway and get lots of high fives. I think some of the kids looked at us like extra grandparents."

Hoppmann calls interacting with many of the school's 250 students (in preschool through seventh grade) a highlight of the project.

This was the second time the congregation has employed Laborers to help with a project. Laborers first worked for Salem

Lutheran about 10 years ago on a classroom and fellowship hall expansion.

"We had grown too crowded," said Salem Building Committee Chairman Tom Brown. "Laborers made this a doable project for us."

In addition to their construction skills, Brown appreciated Laborers' participation in church activities—worship, Bible studies, and chapel services. Even updating and organizing the school library. Hoppmann's wife, Jeanette, led that effort.

"The whole group went out of their way to be helpful in any way they could to our church and to our school," Brown said. "They were a real blessing."

Hoppmann says Laborers also felt blessed by getting to know the congregation—especially the young people. He mentions a new boy at the school who "took to us like grandparents" and a group of fifth-grade girls who regularly sought Laborer Mike Steckelberg for a beforeschool chat.

When students interviewed Laborers as part of a class assignment, they asked why men and women participate in Laborers For Christ.

"We told them we have a lot of fun," Hoppmann said. "And we meet some great people."

itting down to "school" lessons may be something many Laborers have not done in quite a while. With lumber left over from the building project, Project Manager Bob McCoy suggested the Laborer team create matching tables and pint-sized chairs and benches.

"God gave me the idea: we've got this scrap lumber, let's use it this way," McCoy said.

This is a pattern he has used before when making tables and chairs for his grandchildren. Bob's wife, Dorothy, and two women from the church put their creative touches on them by painting

them in bright, primary colors. But what most likely will stick with the kids are the Bible verses painted on the tabletops. Ones such as this:

"'For I know the plans
I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans
to prosper you and not to harm you, plans
to give you hope and a future' "
(Jeremiah 29:11).

"If you read it and see it for a few years, you'll remember it during those teenage years, those hard years," Dorothy said of her hopes for the Bible verses. A lesson left behind by Laborers, even after "school" is dismissed.
